Dr. Richard C. Mawe began his HB training in 1956 while serving as Flight Physiologist in the U.S. Navy. During his tenure at Hunter College, where he retired as the Dean of the Division of Sciences and Mathematics, he continued his studies as well as taught at HB. During those years, he developed a close relationship to HB's founders, Herbert Berghof and Uta Hagen. After Berghof's death, Hagen invited his administrative help and advice. Following Hagen's death, and designation as sole member of the corporation, Mawe created the first Board of Directors for HB Studio, and served as President for many years. During those years, he appeared in many films, TV, and movies, allowing for an awareness of the needs and challenges facing theater artists.
